AT THIS TIME, and in this gallery, most of you who read this will be seeing paintings by Gleitsmann. It is to the others, who will first know of him only through this exhibition catalogue that these words are addressed.

A painter, receptive and introspective, still much aware of the complexities of the world, Gleitsmann was suddenly given active part in the making of war. Now, in paint, he is remembering and seeing that demolition.

Through his reactions to moral, physical and intellectual ruins of war, Gleitsmann gives these paintings. Fragments of ruins, of churches, schools, libraries, symbolically used, give evidence of previous peaks of cultural attainment. Still, Gleitsmann gives hope of rebirth. A spire or a tower is there, back of the ruins, offering a possibility for new growth—an encouragement for the future.

These calm records give more potent comment of the horrors of war than any number of sensational and emotional pictures. The same tranquility and dignity of personal statement carry over into his "civilian" work—into his small brush drawings and watercolors.
